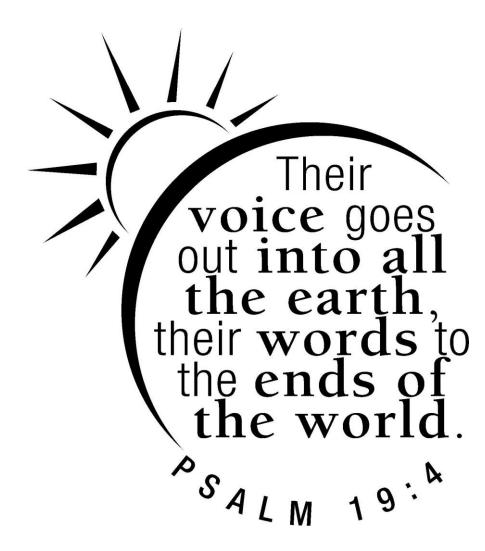

Communion Jan. 31: Next Sunday, we will observe communion in our worship service. Preparing for communion is to take time to examine one's life and relationships with God and the body of Christ (church). It is an opportunity to mend relationships with others. Unity within the body of Christ is one of the themes of communion. Another aspect often overlooked is the giving of alms. This is done at FMC by giving to the Deacons Benevolent Fund.
